

Portland Shrine Hospital Report

The Portland Shrine Hospital is completing the "Year of COVID" with many successes and continuing efforts to treat more kids in more places.

Beginning in January, I will be starting a two year term as Chairman of the Board of Governors for the Portland Hospital. Gayle Kenney from Nile Shrine will be the Vice Chairman, David Fryday from Al Kader is Treasurer, and Keith Christensen from Afifi Shrine will be Secretary for the Board.

Dr. Ellen Raney, MD, from the Portland Hospital recently received the Distinguished Service Award from the American Academy of Pediatrics in Orthopaedics! What makes this honor even more special is that she is the first woman to ever accept this award.

There are podcasts put out by the Portland team on a variety of clinical subjects. The latest topics are on radiology and speech therapy. You can find a link to the podcasts on the Portland Shrine Hospital website or on the Rise and Shrine Monthly Newsletter put out by the Portland Hospital. Please contact me if you need me to send you a link to these information opportunities.

The number of inpatient admissions dropped slightly in November but the number of inpatient and outpatient surgeries has returned to nearly pre-COVID levels. Our draw on the endowment continues to be under budget and is currently 32 percent less year to date than last year. While our adjusted patient days is still seventh highest in the system, net patient revenue continues to be second only to Northern California.

The Board of Governors continues to meet electronically with hospital leadership providing up to date information to us the week before the meeting. We still expect our meetings to be held via Microsoft Teams at least through the first quarter of 2021.

All Nobles can be proud of what is happening every day for kids who continue to need help despite the pandemic. If you have any questions about the Portland Shrine Hospital, please contact Dave Triplett, Mike Mastropaolo, or myself. It is an honor to serve the hospital and the Fraternity in this capacity.

Salt Lake Shrine Hospital Report

2020 Year End Report by Dr. Kristen Carroll, Chief of Staff

We survived. And we still received the Press Gainey award for clinical excellence, Top Workplace award 6 years in a row, and 24th nationwide ranking from US News and World Report.

Surgery: Despite no kids from Mexico, and Covid shutdowns, we still did 78% of cases we did last year, 700 to date. We did 45 EDF casts. The little ones with curved spines rely on us to help them with the EDK technique that reflects specialized care that we provide best. 83% were less than 24 hour stays. Imagine, 30 years ago children stayed in house for 7-10 days.

Outpatient Clinics: Over 500 telehealth clinics were done with an orthopedic surgeon in Juarez, Mexico to get our kids seen. Because of the success of this clinic, Imperial has decided to let us treat Mexico kids in Salt Lake again! Despite all the disruptions, we still saw over 8000 kids in our clinic and have 600 waited listed for surgery. We have added a fracture line and did 20 in November.

Wheelchair and Seating: Ken Kozole, our guru of seating, retired. Despite Covid, 39 kids got Halloween costumes for their chairs. The department refurbished 163 donated chairs, did 1000 refits, readied 150 new chairs. The car seat clinic provided 150 special needs car seats.

Language Services and Care Coordination: This amazing team interpreted for nearly 2800 families. They also complete reams of documents, education brochures, protocols and signage translated to Spanish.

Therapy Services: The team saw 2000 kids through their outpatient department this year and 600 more as inpatient. We gave away 78 adaptive bikes and adapted other bikes with fat wheels.

POPS: They completed 3675 new braces, 195 prosthetic repairs or creations for our kids.

Gait Lab: The Gait Lab evaluated 290 children to clarify surgical, therapeutic, and bracing optimization. Since inception, the gait lab has seen 4000 kids

Development: Nathan Clark is awesome. We raised almost \$3 Million, \$900, 000 in bequests and wills, 427 blankets and toys. Our foundation donations increased this year. The "Walk for Love" raised \$110,000 and had 1000 registrations. We started "Philanthropy News" which a newsletter designed for our donors. It generated \$44000 in donations.

Finance and Revenue Cycle: We are under budget by \$750,000 due to the pandemic's restrictions. We billed 32 million and collected 7 million. We remain dedicated to provide care regardless of a family's ability to pay.

Food! We used 30,000 eggs, 31,000 slices of bread, 4,100 cartons of milk and lots more.

Dear friends, please stay vigilant to our enemy, the COVID virus. Keep yourselves mindful of masking, hand washing, and gathering in groups. Stay 6 feet apart from anyone not in your household. Stay safe until the vaccine reaches us. Please accept my deepest gratitude to each and every one of you for all that you do for each other, our incredible mission and our patients and families. It takes a village my friends!

The History of the American Flag

Part 7 by David Bennett, High Priest & Prophet



The Stars and Stripes is the national and merchant flag and ensign of the United States of America with thirteen stripes (seven red and six white) of the first Union and 50 stars representing the fifty states of the union.

The flag of the President of the United States, is the National Ensign, the flag of the sovereign people of whom he is the popular representative, and from whom he derives power and authority. The President is empowered to design his own flag, but its field is always blue. As presently in use, it displays the presidential seal; this shows the American Eagle grasping in its talons the emblems of peace and war, thirteen arrows and an olive branch, having thirteen leaves. Thirteen stars appear around its head and it is surrounded by a circle of fifty stars, symbolizing the original and the present number of states in the Union. A shield of the national colors bearing seven white and six red stripes also appears, and the Latin motto E Pluribus Unum signifies "From Many, One". It is hoisted at the main and denotes his presence on board a war ship.

The Vice-President and members of the Cabinet (the Secretary of Navy excepted) are also designated by the national flag worn at the fore during their presence on board a vessel of war, and it always floats at the Capitol over the Senate-Chamber and House of Representatives whenever those bodies are in session, - a custom followed in all or most of the States of the Union whenever their legislative bodies are in session.

A special mark for the Secretary of the Navy, established in 1866, was a square blue flag having a white foul anchor placed vertically in the center with four white stars surrounding it, one in each corner of the flag.

Each of the States of our Union and the Territories have flags of their own. This flag is carried by the State militia into battle or on parade side by side with the national standard.

"Old Glory!"

This famous name was coined by Captain William Driver, ship master of Salem, Massachusetts, in 1831. As he was leaving on one of his many voyages aboard the brig Charles Doggett friends presented him with a beautiful American flag of twenty four stars. As the banner opened to the ocean breeze for the first time, he exclaimed "Old Glory!" (This voyage would climax with the rescue of the mutineers of the Bounty).

Captain Driver retired to Nashville in 1837, taking his treasured American flag from his sea days with him. By the time the Civil War erupted, most everyone in and around Nashville recognized Captain Driver's "Old Glory." When Tennessee seceded from the Union, Rebels were determined to destroy his flag, but repeated searches revealed no trace of the hated banner.

Then on February 25th, 1862, Union forces captured Nashville and raised the American flag over the capital. It was a rather small ensign and immediately folks began asking Captain Driver if "Old Glory" still existed. Happy to have soldiers with him this time, Captain Driver went home and began ripping at the seams of his bed cover. As the stitches holding the quilt-top to the batting unraveled, the onlookers peered inside and saw the 24-starred original "Old Glory"!

Captain Driver gently gathered up the flag and returned with the soldiers to the capitol. Though he was sixty years old, the Captain climbed up to the tower to replace the smaller banner with his beloved flag. The Sixth Ohio Regiment cheered and saluted - and later adopted the nickname "Old Glory" as their own, telling and re-telling the story of Captain Driver's devotion to the flag we still honor today.

Captain Driver's grave is located in the old Nashville City Cemetery and is one of three (3) places authorized by act of Congress where the Flag of the United States may be flown 24 hours a day.

A caption above a faded black and white picture in the book, *The Stars and the Stripes*, states that 'Old Glory' may no longer be opened to be photographed, and no color photograph is available. Visible in the photo in the lower right corner of the canton is an applique anchor, Captain Driver's very personal note. "Old Glory" is the most illustrious of a number of flags - both Northern and Confederate - reputed to have been similarly hidden, then later revealed as times changed. The flag was given to his granddaughter or niece who later donated it to the Smithsonian.
