## **Portland Shrine Hospital Report**

The Portland Shrine Hospital has wrapped up 2020 with several positives and plans to treat more kids in more places at a lower cost and lower draw on the endowment.

First, over 89% of the staff have received their first COVID-19 vaccine. As with the flu, controlling the spread of the COVID-19 virus begins with wearing a mask, social distancing, and frequent handwashing but it is enhanced by a large percentage of a population being vaccinated. The staff at the Portland hospital stepped up and got their vaccine so they can help protect the patients and family members who receive care and support at the hospital.

Second, the overall hospital system saw a 24% decrease in outpatient encounters due to the three months of shutdown following the initial COVID outbreak. Portland's outpatient encounters decreased 18% last year. Our draw on the endowment is down 33% from 2019 levels. Decreasing the draw allows the endowment to extend further into the future. While our adjusted patient days is still seventh highest in the system, net patient revenue continues to be second only to Northern California.

On January 15, the staff at the Portland hospital celebrated their 97<sup>th</sup> birthday!

January 20-22 was the Tampa Leadership Conference. Normally, the leadership of the hospitals and Boards of Governors meet in Tampa for this annual conference, but COVID caused the conference to be held via Teams.

The Board of Governors continues to meet electronically with hospital leadership providing up to date information to us the week before the meeting. We still expect our meetings to be held via Microsoft Teams at least through the first quarter of 2021.

All Nobles can be proud of what is happening every day for kids who continue to need help despite the pandemic. ## Salt Lake Shrine Hospital Report

As a follow up to the wonderful pictures of the wheelchairs you've seen, we are proud to announce that the Spirit Halloween Stores in Utah and Idaho donated \$173,050. In total, they have donated \$755,495 in the 11 years they have contributed.

We are continuing to care for our kids in Mexico through telehealth. The goal is to try to get them treated closer to home. Dr. Carroll, our Chief of Staff, is proposing that Imperial approve Juan Rodriguez, MD., who is in Juarez, to do simple surgeries. He already works with our Mexico City Hospital through telehealth. We would ask that the more complicated surgeries be allowed to come to Salt Lake. Our Mission is to always make sure our Kids get the best care — anywhere.

Most of our staff has now been vaccinated. It is not mandated, but most have chosen to do it.

Dr. Carroll reported that the rumor of Autism being related to vaccinations is completely false. The group that proclaimed this has been completely debunked and is facing criminal charges. She pointed out that vaccines have to be approved by the FDA before distribution. She said the risk factor is very low. The Staff is still required to wear masks.

Our Endowment finished the year at \$8.4 billion, the highest ever. When the market crashed, we were down to \$5.7 billion. At our peak before that we were at \$8.3 billion. Donations totaled \$270 million for 2020, which included a single donation of \$25 million.

Also, I will be taking a trailer of donations to Salt Lake in a couple of weeks. If you have items, bring them to El Korah. Thanks,






## Chaplain's Corner

## The History of the American Flag

### Betsy Ross, Maker of the First American Flag

According to popular legend, the first American flag was made by Betsy Ross, a Philadelphia seamstress who was acquainted with George Washington, leader of the Continental Army and other influential Philadelphians. In May 1776, so the story goes, General Washington and two representatives from the Continental Congress visited Ross at her upholstery shop and showed her a rough design of the flag. Although Washington initially favored using a star with six points, Ross advocated a five-pointed star, which she demonstrated, could be cut with just one quick snip of the scissors, and the gentlemen were won over. Thus, in May of 1776, Betsy Ross reported that she sewed the first American flag.

Unfortunately, historians have never been able to verify this version of events. Although it is known that Ross made flags for the Pennsylvania Navy. The story of Washington's visit to the flag maker became popular about the time of the country's first centennial, after William Canby, a grandson of Ross, told about her role in shaping U.S. history in a speech given at the Philadelphia Historical Society in March 1870.

What follows is the true story, to the best of our understanding.

Betsy would often tell her children, grandchildren, relatives and friends of the fateful day when three members of a secret committee from the Continental Congress came to call upon her. Those representatives, George Washington, Robert Morris and George Ross, asked her to sew the first flag. This meeting occurred in her home some time late in May 1776. George Washington was then the head of the

Continental Army. Robert Morris, an owner of vast amounts of land, was perhaps the wealthiest citizen in the Colonies.

Colonel George Ross was a respected Philadelphian and also the uncle of her late husband, John Ross. Naturally, Betsy Ross already knew George Ross as she had married his nephew. Furthermore, Betsy was also acquainted with the great General Washington. Not only did they both worship at Christ Church in Philadelphia, but Betsy's pew was next to George and Martha Washington's pew.

Her daughter recalled, "That she was previously well acquainted with Washington, and that he had often been in her house in friendly visits, as well as on business. That she had embroidered ruffles for his shirt bosoms and cuffs, and that it was partly owing to his friendship for her that she was chosen to make the flag."

In June 1776, brave Betsy was a widow struggling to run her own upholstery business. Upholsterers in colonial America not only worked on furniture but did all manner of sewing work, which included making flags. According to Betsy, General Washington showed her a rough design of the flag that included a six-pointed star. Betsy, a standout with the scissors, demonstrated how to cut a five-pointed star in a single snip. Impressed, the committee entrusted Betsy with making our first flag.

Betsy Ross is often credited for creating the first American flag, yet, most probably she was the person responsible for sewing the first American flag. According to the legend, George Washington himself approached Elizabeth Ross in 1777 and asked her to create a flag from a sketch he drew. She then sewed this first flag for the new country. However, the story is open to interpretation. There is no record of this incident discussed in any official or anecdotal documents of the time. In fact, the story was not told until 94 years after the event took place by one of Betsy Ross' grandsons, William J. Canby.

During the Revolutionary War, several patriots made flags for our new nation. Among them were Cornelia Bridges, Rebecca Young, and Elizabeth (Betsy) Ross, all of whom were from Pennsylvania, and John Shaw of Annapolis, Maryland.

Although Betsy Ross, the best known of these persons, made flags for 50 years, there is no proof that she made the first Stars and Stripes. It is known that she made flags for the Pennsylvania State Navy in 1777. The flag popularly known as the "Betsy Ross flag", which arranged the stars in a circle, did not appear until the early 1790's.

The claims of Betsy Ross were first brought to the attention of the public in 1870 by one of her grandsons, William J. Canby. In a paper he read before the meeting of the Historical Society of Pennsylvania, Canby stated:

"It is not tradition, it is report from the lips of the principal participator in the transaction, directly told not to one or two, but a dozen or more living witnesses, of which I myself am one, though but a little boy when I heard it.

Colonel Ross with Robert Morris and General Washington, called on Mrs. Ross and told her they were a committee of Congress and wanted her to make a flag from the drawing, a rough one, which, upon her suggestions, was redrawn by General Washington in pencil in her back parlor. This was prior to the Declaration of Independence. I fix the date to be during Washington's visit to Congress from New York in June, 1776 when he came to confer upon the affairs of the Army, the flag being no doubt, one of these affairs."
