I would like to thank the Nobility for participating in the parades over the summer.

September brings back Stated Meetings, Treefort and Grand Lodge. I encourage all of you to attend the September Stated Meeting on September 8th, either in person or virtually. If you plan to attend and eat dinner, please RSVP to the Recorder's Office, so he can make sure we have enough food.

The September Stated meeting looks to be a very contentious meeting. The rumor mill and discussions of selling our building has been happening for the 20+ years I have been a member. A few years ago, an offer was actually made. We had a town hall meeting in 2019 to discuss the offer and our possible future meeting place. Last year, we were mostly shut down due to COVID restrictions. Over the last two years, I have fielded questions on whether we are selling our building or not.

Nobles, it's time to make a decision and stop kicking the can down the road!

At our September 8th Stated Meeting, we will be voting on our building. This is a very complicated and sensitive issue.





- A "NO" vote means we stay, start renovating the building and deal with the issues, such as the lack of parking, etc.
- A "YES" vote directs the elected Board of Directors to market and sell the building.

I can't in good faith ask our Board of Directors to look at selling and finding a new building if the Nobility is allowed to say no to any offer. A "YES" vote is a binding commitment to sell our building and allows the Board of Directors to secure a knowledgeable commercial agent, pay any fees, and entertain legitimate offers. According to our Bylaws, the final offer must be approved by a vote of the Nobility, which requires a 20 day notice.

No, we don't know what our building is worth and at this point we don't need to. If the Nobility votes "NO", there is no need to put forth the extra work that would be needed to sell, including assessing its value.

If a "YES" vote happens, we will obtain an agent who will assess the value of our building, market it, and then bring any offers back to the Board of Directors.

Brother Brown's wants to support the Nobility and their events. Just call ahead and work out the details.




Chaplain's Corner

2021 Treefort Music Fest

Treefort is this month, starting on Wednesday, September 22nd and going through Sunday, September 26th. We will have 33 bands coming through our building, as well as thousands of guests coming through our building each day. With that, we are in need of your help! Volunteers are being asked to step forward and help out in and around the building during the event. Even if you are only available for one day, we still need you!

We are looking for people for the Token Room, which will be set up in the Gold Room and can involve anything from selling tokens, counting tokens, counting money, or being a runner that collects tokens. Jack Moore, our Parade Director, is responsible for the Token Team.

We are also looking for help in the Counting Room, which will be in the Recorder's Office. This group is counts all monies and prepares the deposits that are made at the end of each night. Jimmy Hansen, our Recorder, is responsible for the Counting Team.

Other volunteers needed are for selling Tokens around the building, for watching doors for security and to make sure people don't sneak in, and for helping the bartenders (getting more beer or ice, taking out trash, etc.)

As you might have heard, Treefort is working with the Idaho CDC to make sure that the event is safe for everyone. Those who are attending Treefort will be required to get a specific wrist band at the main event center. Wrist bands will be given to guests that have their Vaccination Card or have a recent negative test.

Now, you are probably wondering how this will affect us ... If you are volunteering for El Korah, you are required to have a mask available and it is recommend that you use it during the event, as needed. One of the bands on Thursday night (the final performance) has specifically asked that everyone wear a mask during their performance. We'll ask our volunteers to do the same, when you're out in the public.

Portland Shrine Hospital Report

The Portland Board of Governors continued to meet in person throughout the summer, but with the increase in COVID cases in Oregon, we may be forced to go back to Teams meetings again. It has been great for all of us to get together (in the auditorium instead of the Board room) and share fellowship while working to support and provide governance for the Portland Hospital.

Our volumes are increasing and will likely be at or exceeding budget by the end of the year. Our outpatient volumes are growing rapidly while inpatient volumes should be increasing with more cases from Shrine hospitals which are transitioning to outpatient clinics. Net patient revenue is still second only to Northern California for all Shrine hospitals but our draw on the endowment has dropped to only \$3.5 million year to date, down from \$6 million year to date last year. While the hospital saw a nearly \$5 million increase in total receipts year to date from 2020 to 2021, our operating expenses increased by only \$1 million.



Attending from the hospital were Dereesa Reid, Administrator, and Kathy Park, Director of Development. Board members present besides myself were Ron Gamble and Martin Klos. Representing El Korah at the game were Ill. Sir Dave Thomas, Ric Bobier (Emeritus Member of the Portland Board), and me. The Tin Lizzies and Sand Duners participated in the parade much to the delight of the crowd. A special thank you to these El Korah units who took time to be in the parade!

On Monday, August 30, the Board members cooked and served a barbecue lunch for all hospital staff as a reflection of our appreciation of their efforts through the struggles in dealing with COVID while maintaining a high quality of care for our patients. We as a Board are extremely proud of the work and caring our staff deliver to our patients!

There are no Board positions opening up at the end of this year but there are five positions opening up for next year. If you are interested in serving on the Board, please let one of our current Board members (Mike Mastropaolo, Dave Triplett, or me) know. Any one of us can answer questions you may have about what it means to be a member and the expectations of a member of a Hospital Board.

Memorial Day Weekend we


