

Chaplain's Corner

In a recent article in a local newspaper, the focus was on The Day of the Dead (Día de los Muertos) in Mexico which has roots in ancient Aztec and other pre-Hispanic indigenous rituals. See Meso-American Roots for more information.

The roots of Día de los Muertos stretch back over 3,000 years to Meso-American cultures like the Olmecs, who believed the realms of the living and the dead blurred during this time of year, which honored the dead as a natural part of life.

When the Spanish arrived in the 16th century, these traditions merged with Catholic observances, particularly <u>All Saints' Day</u> and <u>All Souls' Day</u>, which are celebrated on November 1st and 2nd. This fusion evolved into the modern holidays, which are not times for mourning, but rather a festive celebration of deceased ancestors and loved ones.

I have a personal story to share . . .

On my morning beach fishing excursions, miles from our resort in Mazatlan, I discovered a very large boulder next to a cliff and just above the tidelines. I saw some decoration on top and my curiosity led me to further investigations. There were fresh flowers, bowls of water, and food, along with photos. I do not go that direction every morning, but whenever I do, there is always a fresh memorial set up. And every year it has been the same, which gives special meaning to the newspaper article on the reverence this culture had and has for its dead.

Additionally, All Saints' Day (November 1st) celebrates the saints in heaven, while All Souls' Day (November 2nd) is dedicated to praying for the souls of all the faithful departed, especially those in purgatory, to aid their journey to heaven.

All Saints' Day is a feast day honoring holy individuals, From Wikipedia, All Saints' Day is also known as All Hallows' Day, the Feast of All Saints, the Feast of All Hallows, the Solemnity of All Saints, and Hallowmas and is a Christian solemnity celebrated in honor of all the saints of the Church, whether they are known or unknown.

Whereas All Souls' Day, also called The Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed, is a day of prayer and remembrance for the faithful departed and observed by Christians on November 2nd. For the Catholics, this day includes holding Masses for the dead, according to the Catholic Answers website.

The Iris flowers that I grow bloom a little early in May, but we always have enough to go out to the cemetery to decorate Ann's parents' graves on May 25th. I usually make a large cross with all the flowers and give some prayers and thanks.

Locally I have aided the Exchange Club in placing small flags at the graves of our warriors and helped pick them up on different Memorial days.

From our Civil War History, please read the poem "Decoration Day" by Henry Wadsworth Longfellow. The poem, which was first published in *The Atlantic* in 1882, commemorates fallen soldiers from the Civil War.

Sleep, comrades, sleep and rest On this Field of the Grounded Arms, Where foes no more molest, Nor sentry's shot alarms!

Ye have slept on the ground before, And started to your feet At the cannon's sudden roar, Or the drum's redoubling beat.

But in this camp of Death No sound your slumber breaks; Here is no fevered breath, No wound that bleeds and aches.

All is repose and peace, Untrampled lies the sod; The shouts of battle cease, It is the Truce of God!

Rest, comrades, rest and sleep! The thoughts of men shall be As sentinels to keep Your rest from danger free.

Your silent tents of green We deck with fragrant flowers; Yours has the suffering been, The memory shall be ours.


